Recognize Your Revolutionary Ancestor

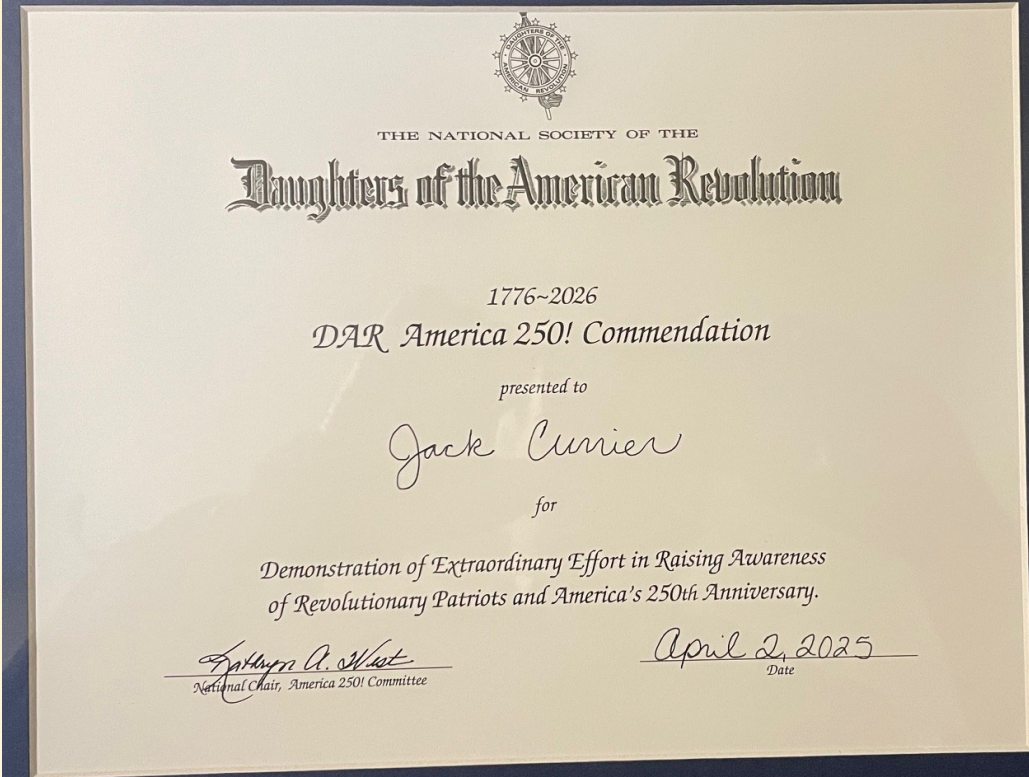

Idaho SAR Efforts to Recognize the 250th Anniversary of the American Revolution

The National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution (NSSAR) has developed a recognition program designed to encourage and recognize those compatriots, chapters, and societies that participate in local, state, national, and international events that publicly educate, and recognize, honor, and celebrate the events and heroes of the period surrounding the American Revolution. Idaho IDSSAR President Chapman has firmly endorsed the position that IDSSAR members actively participate in the NSSAR 250th Recognition Program, and in doing so, encourages the state's Chapters and Compatriots to read the Recognition Program's guidelines and seek ways that they can fulfill the program's requirements to achieve national recognition for our Idaho Society participation in the program. Participation involves planning and executing of 250th events, as well as attendance. Medals can be awarded for our efforts to comply with the program's requirements.

Medals cover any event celebrating and promoting the 250th Anniversary. This will cover any public events celebrating and promoting the 250th Anniversary in the period from 2014 to 2033. Forms may be submitted for multiple years. Scorekeeping is the responsibility of each compatriot and awarding authority. The awarding authority for each medal is as follows. For consistency, the Bronze and Silver Medals will be authorized and recorded by the NSSAR America 250 Committee. The Gold Medal is only authorized and recorded by the NSSAR 250th Anniversary Committee. President Chapman's says, "Let's go for the gold!" 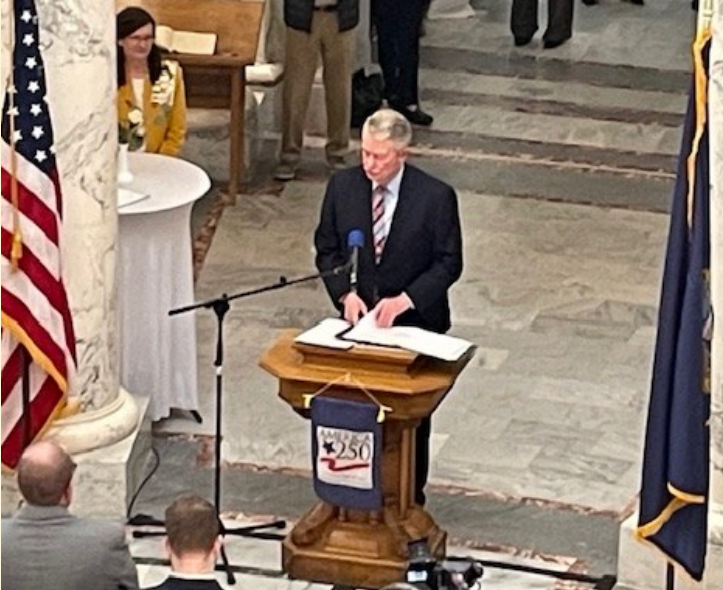

April 1775:

The Stand-Off in Massachusetts

Tensions were high amongst the colonists by the Spring of 1775. Earlier actions by both the New England colonists and British Government led to anger between the parties, resulting in patriot protests and resistance against the rule of King George III and the English Parliament.

In furtherance of the Crown's authority, The New England Restraining Act. In March 1775, Parliament passed the New England Restraining Act. The act forbade the New England colonies of Massachusetts Bay, Providence Plantations, and Connecticut to trade with any other country besides Great Britain, Ireland, and the British West Indies. The Act also made it illegal for the colonists to fish in the North Atlantic. Later, the other New England colonies were added to the Act's enforcement policy.

The colonists raging discontent led Britain to take harsh steps to put down any means of rebellion. By April 1775, Thomas Gage, the Crown's representative in Massachusetts, believed he was facing the threat of rebellion. Word reached sources that the Colonists had weapons stored at Concord, intended to be used to overthrow the King's rule of the colony. Gage instituted a plan to prevent any violence by ordering the seizure of weapons and powder being stored in Concord, twenty miles northwest of Boston. However, he underestimated the courage and determination of the colonists.

Early on, British troops were turned back from Concord without violence occurring. Scorned by the colonists' action, Gage felt the need to crush the colonists' determination and their insolence to the Crown. Gage prepared a second effort to capture the weapons and ammunition at Concord.

Lexington and Concord. Gage put together a force of about 800 British troops, which he sent to destroy the colonists' ammunition stored at Concord. On April 18th, after discovering the British plan to capture Patriot leaders, weapons and supplies, the *Boston Committee of Safety* prepared to send Paul Revere and William Dawes on horseback to alert the countryside and gather the aid of the colonists within the colonial militias known as the *Minute Men*.

On the night of April 18, colonial spies sent the Boston Committee on Safety additional information regarding the British plans. Historians say it was either Sexton Robert Newman or Vestryman Captain John Pulling Jr. that climbed the steeple stairs and put lantern signals in Boston's North Church, The lanterns signaled Revere and William Dawes to spread their message from to the towns from Boston to Lexington and Concord. Both men rode that night, covering different routes.

On April 19, the Minutemen from Lexington and British troops faced off at Lexington Green, where a shot, from what some thought was a stray British gun led to more British firing. The first British volley of fire left 12 colonists dead or wounded. The Americans only returned fire with a few rifle shots before fleeing. The British marched on to Concord and destroyed some of the ammunition. Soon, the British found the countryside swarming with colonial militia. The British fled back to Boston, under sporadic fire from the guns of the various town militia who, at random, picked off the British Soldiers. At the end of the day, there were many who died on both sides.

Though it is uncertain who actually fired the first shot that day, it reverberated throughout history. Eight years of war followed, and those who stood their ground against Gage's troops eventually earned independence from Britain and became citizens of the United States of America.

In Lexington today, the Minute Man National Historic Park maintains and interprets multiple sites associated with the first day of fighting of the American Revolution. A multimedia theater program about the battles there, and a 6-mile walking trail or driving tour includes the area of Parker's Revenge, the site where Paul Revere was captured, the Minute Man Statue, and the famous North Bridge in Concord.

In Our Memories

Remembering Jesse Jones

The Board of Managers of our State Society was notified on April 4, 2025, of the passing of our dear friend, Compatriot Jesse Jones.

Jesse had been a member of the Idaho State Society of the Sons of the American Revolution since 2021. He was a veteran of the U.S. Army. In his later years, Compatriot Jones was facing severe health problems, though, just two months prior to his death, he had been through successful surgery that he told his friends had cleared up his most debilitating physical disabilities. His death was very unexpected. Jesse was buried on April 3, 2025, with military honors, in the State of Washington.

Jesse Jones' ancestor compatriot was Jacob Motsinger Sr., who moved his family from Pennsylvania in the 1760s to Rowan Co., NC and purchased land in the Abbotts Creek area (Davidson Co.). Both Jacob Sr. and Jacob Jr. are recorded as fighting against the British and Tories in South Carolina with Francis Marion (the Swamp Fox), a family historical feature that made Jesse very proud. Jacob Sr. was a valuable procurer of food, supplies and information for The Swamp Fox, while Jacob Jr., still a boy of 14, was fleet on his feet carrying messages and fighting with the Swamp Fox. Francis Marion depended upon the fathers of the boys he had fighting for him to strike against the Tories and escape. British General Ferguson had 4,000 Tories operating against Marion, while Lt. Col. Tarleton was always on his heels. Francis Marion, at the time, was operating with only 35 men in his Glorious Army, the only men for a long time fighting for the cause of Liberty in North and South Carolina. ~

Remembering James Post

The Board of Managers of our State Society were notified in March of the passing of Compatriot James Gary Post, known mostly as "Gary", of Moscow, Idaho. Compatriot Post had been a member of the Idaho State Society of the Sons of the American Revolution since August 2015.

Gary was a 6-year veteran of the U.S. Army, and, after attending the University of Idaho, he had a career in the field conservation for the USDA-NRCS, first as a soil scientist and progressing to area conservationist for Northern Idaho until his retirement. Gary's interest in his family's heritage was a passion of his. He wrote a 295-page book on his family's history entitled, "One Post Family in America: 1650-2015," and led his son and daughter into becoming members of SAR and DAR. Compatriot Post passed into the arms of his lord on February 26, 2025. Paul Revere Lantern

Similar lanterns might normally have helped pedestrians navigate Boston's dark streets, but this particular example entered the annals of history when it was used as a signal on the night of April 18, 1775. Paul Revere had arranged the signal with the Charlestown militia the week before; one lantern if the British Regulars left Boston over Roxbury Neck (by land) and two if they crossed the Charles River (by sea). The signal worked, and the Regulars' secret raid on Provincial military supplies turned into the first battle of the Revolutionary War.

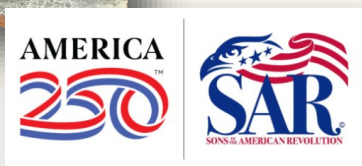
